Grace Council Statement on Racism





HOLY GOSPEL: Luke 2:1–20

P The Holy Gospel according to St. Luke, the second chapter.

Glory to you, O Lord.

¹In those days a decree went out from Emperor Augustus that all the world should be registered. ²This was the first registration and was taken while Quirinius was governor of Syria. ³All went to their own towns to be registered. ⁴Joseph also went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to the city of David called Bethlehem, because he was descended from the house and family of David. ⁵He went to be registered with Mary, to whom he was engaged and who was expecting a child. ⁶While they were there, the time came for her to deliver her child. ⁷And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn.

⁸In that region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. ⁹Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. ¹⁰But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid; for see—I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: ¹¹to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord. ¹²This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger." ¹³And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying, ¹⁴"Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favors!" ¹⁵When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let us go now to Bethlehem and see this thing that has taken place, which the Lord has made known to us." ¹⁶So they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the child lying in the manger. ¹⁷When they saw this, they made known what had been told them about this child; ¹⁸and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds told them. ¹⁹But Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart. ²⁰The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, as it had been told them.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried.



We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.


We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

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Background Information on the text by George Herbert

George Herbert (1593–1633), well born and Cambridge-educated, was headed for a promising career in government and at court when he decided to enter the ministry in order to serve as a country parson in the tiny church at Bemerton. On his deathbed a short three years later he handed a sheaf of poems to his friend Nicholas Ferrar to either burn or do with as he thought fit. These poems, published in 1633 as *The Temple*, comprise some of the most finely wrought, spiritually astute, beautiful poems in the English language.

Reading a Herbert poem, one is at first struck by what seems to be the plain language and what one critic has called the "artlessness." But a Herbert poem under its surface simplicity always reveals a complexity of tone and meaning, a theological sophistication, and an intricate weaving of image and theme. Even so, in these poems one is always aware of Herbert's immense humility.

"Christmas" is a poem in two parts. The text of the piece we hear today is the first part of the poem. In this poem the speaker and his horse have ridden all day and, exhausted and distracted (having pursued pleasure until there is no more pleasure to be had), stop at the first inn available. In this place he finds his "deare, My dearest Lord," who has been waiting until the "grief of pleasures brought me to him." In other words, pleasure pursued for its own sake brings restlessness and dissatisfaction, but Christ is present at this inn to give "sweet relief" to all passersby. The speaker describes Christ as the glorious Son of God whose light "contracted" into human form as a baby in a manger, also found in the stable of an inn. Since the speaker's dark, brutish soul belongs to Christ, he prays that Christ would dress the speaker's soul and in doing so find a better lodging than a "rack," the place for hay or straw that the manger was. "Rack" also refers to an instrument of torture, or the cross. In furnishing the speaker's soul, Christ will also redeem the speaker.
